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Executive Summary

The fourth quarter of the 2025–2026 leadership term represented a period of marked advancement, strengthened coordination, and enhanced institutional visibility across the Liberian Students Union in China (LSUIC). Covering the months of April through June 2026, this phase reflected a mature stage of operational execution, during which both city chapters and the National Secretariat delivered substantive results in governance, welfare, communication, and community engagement.

Across LSUIC’s city chapters, leadership teams demonstrated disciplined performance through targeted welfare interventions, academic support initiatives, cultural programming, democratic transitions, and strengthened administrative practices. Xuzhou expanded its welfare loan scheme and hosted major community-building events; Wuhan reinforced unity through sports and collective mobilization; Suzhou conducted a transparent election and broadened welfare activities; Zhenjiang advanced academic preparedness and cultural visibility; Changchun finalized preparations for major national programs; Nantong and Wuhu celebrated leadership graduations; Taizhou excelled in cultural representation and electoral processes; Xi’an ensured a seamless leadership transition and strong sports performance; Huai’an delivered comprehensive welfare support; Jinhua executed a competitive election season; Qingdao strengthened academic guidance; Huzhou promoted social cohesion; and Hangzhou advanced cultural integration and democratic participation.

At the national level, the Secretariat sustained institutional continuity through the publication of six editions of the LSUIC Chronicle, reinforcing documentation and communication across dispersed chapters. Business development progressed with the registration of one additional enterprise, bringing the total to twelve. Communication and branding support remained robust, highlighted by the Birthday Recognition Initiative, which honored 373 members and strengthened morale. Digital visibility expanded significantly, with Facebook recording 10K engagements, a 73% increase, and 550 new followers. The WeChat Channel generated 20,409 views from 40 new videos and gained 220 followers, while 111 videos were uploaded to YouTube to preserve institutional memory. Collectively, the quarter underscored LSUIC’s commitment to transparency, student welfare, digital modernization, and sustained organizational growth.

1.0 Introduction

1.1 Purpose of the Report

This report provides a detailed overview of the key activities, accomplishments, and operational realities of the Liberian Students Union in China (LSUIC) during the fourth quarter of the 2025–2026 leadership term. It serves as an informative resource for members, alumni, and strategic partners, outlining the Union’s progress in modernizing its digital record-keeping systems, strengthening communication channels, advancing inclusive governance practices, and supporting administrative functions across city chapters. Beyond documenting achievements, the report reaffirms LSUIC’s dedication to transparency, responsible leadership, and sustainable institutional development. It also presents the Union’s practical responses to financial limitations and engagement-related challenges, demonstrating a continued commitment to adaptive management and long-term organizational resilience.

1.2 Reporting Period

This report covers activities undertaken from April to June 2026, representing the closing phase of Quarter Four and a decisive moment in advancing the leadership’s agenda. During these months, the Union moved steadily through its implementation cycle, applying planned measures and reinforcing ongoing initiatives across its structures. The results captured in this section illustrate how coordinated effort, consistent follow-through, and operational discipline shaped the Union’s progress, offering a clear view of how priorities were translated into tangible outcomes.

2.0 Quarterly Achievement of Cities

2.1 Xuzhou Union of Liberian Students (XULS)

During the fourth quarter, the Xuzhou Union of Liberian Students (XULS) made significant progress in strengthening student welfare, unity, and institutional engagement. The union continued its Student Loan Initiative, providing emergency financial relief to students facing temporary challenges. Two additional students benefited this quarter, bringing the total beneficiaries to five, with loans offered at a low 5% interest rate to maintain a sustainable revolving fund. XULS successfully hosted Gathering 3.0, a unity-building picnic at Yunlong Lake that brought together over 25 Liberian students. The event enhanced social cohesion, increased awareness of union programs, and deepened understanding of student needs. The union also organized a major Dinner and Award Ceremony, presenting 31 awards to outstanding scholars and contributors. This celebration strengthened pride, motivation, and academic excellence within the community. Additionally, XULS completed the 2026 election process through the Independent Electoral Commission, ensuring transparency despite the absence of candidates. The leadership formally acknowledged the IEC’s professionalism and outlined future steps. Overall, XULS demonstrated strong leadership, community engagement, and commitment to student welfare throughout the quarter.

2.2 Wuhan Union of Liberian Students (WULS)

The fourth quarter of 2026 was marked by significant progress in fostering unity, student welfare, and national pride among Liberian students in Wuhan. WULS successfully organized a student gathering that strengthened networking and raised funds to support the Wuhan Lonestar Football Team. The leadership also coordinated Liberia's participation in the Wuhan AFCON 2026

tournament by facilitating transportation and mobilizing strong community support, reinforcing solidarity among Liberian students. In addition, WULS, in collaboration with the Class of 2026, hosted a successful One-Day Sports Day to honor graduating students, promoting teamwork, friendship, and appreciation for their contributions. These initiatives reflected the leadership's commitment to effective planning, collaboration, and student-centered service, while enhancing community engagement, recreational participation, and organizational cohesion. Overall, the quarter demonstrated WULS' dedication to building a vibrant, united, and supportive Liberian student community in Wuhan.

2.3 Suzhou Union of Liberian Students (SULS)

The Fourth Quarter of 2026 was a highly productive period for the Liberian Student Union in Suzhou, marked by strong organizational performance, active welfare engagement, and a successful democratic transition. The Union held consistent monthly General Meetings, reviewed and adopted its local constitution, strengthened constitutional compliance, and improved committee accountability through regular reporting. A major milestone was the peaceful and transparent conduct of the Union's election on June 10, 2026, resulting in the election of Mr. Andrew Success Howe as President-Elect. The Executive and Election Committees collaborated effectively, including developing an MoU to address vacant positions. Welfare achievements were notable, with continued Chinese Tutorial Classes, Mental Health Awareness Sessions, fitness activities, and a successful Movie Night Closing Program on June 27, 2026. Committees also advanced plans for graduation recognition and future programs. Financial management improved through transparency efforts and preparation of a comprehensive turnover report, despite low dues participation. Overall, the quarter demonstrated strengthened leadership accountability, enhanced student welfare, and meaningful progress toward a smooth administrative transition.

2.4 Zhenjiang Union of Liberian Students (ZULS)

In the course of the fourth quarter of 2026, the Zhenjiang Union of Liberian Students achieved significant progress across academics, culture, leadership, and alumni engagement. The Union successfully organized a Final Exam Preparation Bootcamp, led by top-performing Chinese graduate students, providing intensive tutoring in Advanced Mathematics and HSK Chinese. According to the report, "participant feedback was overwhelmingly positive," with students feeling more confident for final exams. The Union also hosted the 10th Annual Liberian Independence Day Celebration, featuring cultural displays, traditional cuisine, and speeches that strengthened unity and elevated the Union's profile on campus. A smooth leadership transition was executed through a comprehensive workshop on budgeting, conflict resolution, and event management, followed by a full audit of digital records to support the incoming administration. Additionally, the Union strengthened alumni relations by compiling a complete alumni database and hosting a virtual meet-and-greet that created new mentorship and sponsorship opportunities.

2.5 Changchun Union of Liberian Students (CULS)

Amid this quarter in Changchun, Liberian students demonstrated strong teamwork and unity through fully attended activities such as meetings, birthday celebrations, cultural events, and student-wellbeing initiatives. The report notes that these activities were carried out "with so much passion and vigor," reflecting the students' commitment to supporting one another and strengthening their community. Significant progress was made in planning major upcoming Union activities. The province finalized preparations for the July 26 Independence Day celebration, the LSUIC National Convention, and the Province Election. Students expressed willingness to participate in the

convention, and leadership began working to help those facing constraints so the province could achieve strong representation. Leadership also discussed the end of the current tenure and the need for a clear measure for conducting city president elections. Overall, the quarter showcased unity, active participation, and effective preparation for major Union programs.

2.6 Nantong Union of Liberian Students (NULS)

Throughout the fourth quarter, the Nantong City Chapter achieved several important milestones. The leadership team received an official certificate of recognition for their dedicated service and effective coordination of chapter activities. The chapter successfully organized its year-end dinner, strengthening unity among members. A major highlight was the graduation of three executive leaders, Hon. Sonnie B. Akoi, Hon. Titus D. Kerkula, and Hon. K. Samuel Reed, an accomplishment celebrated by the student body. Leadership maintained consistent administrative performance, including executive consultations, preparation of quarterly and annual reports, and coordination with Provincial and National LSUIC authorities. Student welfare support remained active, offering guidance on academics, accommodation, and daily life while encouraging dues payment and peer support.

2.7 Wuhu Union of Liberian Students (WULS)

Over the fourth quarter of 2026, the LSUIC Wuhu City Chapter recorded meaningful achievements across leadership, academics, and student participation. Leadership remained active and committed, ensuring stability and continued engagement in chapter activities. Members participated in educational programs both on and off campus, contributing to their academic and professional development. A key milestone of the quarter was the successful graduation of the City President, who earned a Master's Degree in Industrial Economics from Anhui Polytechnic University, an accomplishment that reflects both personal excellence and the chapter's academic strength. The chapter maintained a stable membership of five students and continued encouraging growth by supporting newly arriving Liberian students. Additionally, one member participated in an athletic program, demonstrating extracurricular involvement and representation beyond academics. Overall, the quarter showcased academic achievement, leadership continuity, student participation, and optimism for future expansion within the Wuhu City Chapter.

2.8 Taizhou Union of Liberian Students (TULS)

Over the course of the fourth quarter (April–June 2026), the LSUIC Taizhou City Chapter achieved several important milestones that strengthened its visibility, leadership, and participation at both provincial and national levels. The chapter held regular meetings to maintain communication, coordinate plans, and update members on LSUIC activities. Members actively participated in the Taizhou African Cup of Nations, reaching the semifinals and demonstrating teamwork and sportsmanship. The chapter also represented Liberia at the International Cultural Festival at Taizhou University on June 6, promoting cultural exchange. A major accomplishment was the successful conduct of chapter elections, resulting in the election of Hon. T. Johnson Yarkpowolo as President for the 2026/2027 fiscal year. Members attended the Zhejiang Provincial Conference in Ningbo and contributed to the combined Taizhou–Ningbo team that won the provincial football tournament, earning recognition for the chapter. Additionally, the chapter participated in provincial fundraising efforts to support student attendance at the upcoming LSUIC National Conference.

2.9 Xi'an Union of Liberian Students (XULS)

All through the fourth quarter of 2026, the LSUIC Xi'an City Chapter achieved several important milestones that strengthened leadership continuity, student engagement, and community participation. A major accomplishment was the successful leadership handover ceremony on June 15, where key documents, financial records, and ongoing projects were formally transferred, ensuring a smooth and transparent transition. The chapter also excelled in sports, advancing to the final of the Xi'an AFCON Tournament and securing second place, a result that enhanced Liberia's visibility and promoted teamwork and unity among students. Additionally, the chapter organized farewell sporting activities for graduating students, creating a positive environment for interaction, appreciation, and community bonding. Throughout the quarter, leadership maintained consistent student support, offering academic and welfare guidance while encouraging participation in the upcoming LSUIC National Conference. These achievements reflect strong organization, active engagement, and sustained commitment to student welfare during an academically demanding period.

2.10 Huai'an Union of Liberian Students (HULS)

During the April through June 2026 reporting period, the Huai'an Union of Liberian Students (HULS) achieved several important milestones focused on student support, graduation activities, and community cohesion. The chapter successfully organized a guided campus tour for all Liberian students, strengthening campus familiarity, social connection, and collective belonging. HULS also hosted a graduation event honoring five master's graduates, celebrating their academic accomplishments and contributions to the student community. A major achievement was the chapter's continuous one-on-one welfare support for graduating students, including assistance with short-term apartment rentals, visa extension procedures, and health follow-ups for a member involved in an e-bike accident. Leadership also carried out routine administrative coordination with university authorities and local exit-entry offices to resolve residence and visa matters for graduates. These accomplishments reflect HULS's commitment to student welfare, academic recognition, and strong administrative support during a critical transition period.

3.0 Jinhua Union of Liberian Students (JULS)

Within the fourth quarter, the Jinhua Union of Liberian Students (JULS) achieved several major milestones that strengthened unity, transparency, and student participation. The chapter successfully held monthly general meetings, ensuring consistent communication, evaluation of activities, and active member involvement in decision-making. On May 30, JULS organized a city-wide picnic, promoting unity, relaxation, and community bonding among Liberian students. A significant achievement was the official launch of the Jinhua election season, managed by the city IEC in coordination with the national IEC. Two political parties, APP and USA, held well-organized campaign launches featuring speeches and cultural engagement. JULS also participated in the provincial election debate, showcasing strong representation at the Zhejiang Province level. On June 15, the chapter conducted a transparent and successful election, with the United Students Alliance (USA) emerging victorious with 53.8%. Leadership further strengthened JULS's visibility through active participation in provincial and national committees, enhancing collaboration and representation.

3.1 Xi'an Union of Liberian Students (XULS)

From January–March 2026, the Xi'an City leadership remained active despite the vacation period, focusing on student support rather than large-scale activities. Key efforts included providing visa renewal assistance, where all affected students were successfully guided through the process without academic disruption. Plans were also made for a back-to-school sports event on March 28 to promote engagement and student well-being. While activity levels were reduced due to students traveling, the quarter highlighted the need for flexible planning. Moving forward, the leadership aims to increase membership registration, organize outdoor activities, support graduating students, and encourage participation in the upcoming national conference.

3.3 Qingdao Union of Liberian Student (QULS)

Throughout the fourth quarter, leadership of Qingdao strengthened communication and support for students by providing regular updates on academic progress, graduation preparations, scholarship opportunities, and personal welfare. Students were encouraged to stay focused on their academic goals while maintaining active participation in community activities. The chapter also enhanced unity through consistent engagement on LSUIC platforms, peer support, and open communication. Leadership promoted transparency in organizational matters and encouraged broader involvement in union affairs. Overall, the quarter demonstrated improved academic guidance, stronger community cohesion, and sustained leadership commitment to student welfare and participation.

3.4 Huzhou Union of Liberian Students (HULS)

Over the fourth quarter, the Huzhou Union successfully strengthened social engagement and leadership participation through key community activities. A friendly basketball tournament on April 18 brought Liberian and Nigerian students together, promoting teamwork, cultural exchange, and sportsmanship. On May 24, the union hosted a movie night, creating a relaxed environment for students to bond and unwind from academic responsibilities. The quarter concluded with a peaceful and transparent city election on June 15, where Fatumata S. Kieta was elected President as an independent candidate, reflecting members' confidence in her leadership.

3.5 Hangzhou Union of Liberian Students (HULS)

During the fourth quarter, the Hangzhou City Chapter achieved significant progress in community engagement, cultural integration, and democratic participation. The quarter opened with a successful Welcome and Reconnection Program at Hangzhou Normal University, featuring a friendly soccer match with Ghanaian students that strengthened cross-cultural relationships and expanded the union's network. A communal meal further enhanced unity and belonging. In May, the chapter organized a Reconciliation and Unity Meet at Zhejiang Sci-Tech University, followed by a friendly kickball match and interactive games with prizes. These activities boosted teamwork, participation, and harmony among members. The chapter also conducted election sensitization sessions, educating students on voting procedures and leadership responsibilities. On June 15, Hangzhou held a smooth and transparent city election, resulting in the election of Hon. David D. Morris as President. Overall, the quarter demonstrated strong leadership, active participation, and meaningful community-building achievements.

4.0 National Secretariat Report

4.1. Overview

The fourth quarter reflected a period of consolidated advancement within the National Secretariat, characterized by strengthened communication systems, enhanced documentation practices, and expanded digital visibility across LSUIC platforms. The Secretariat sustained consistent national engagement through the publication of six editions of the LSUIC Chronicle, reinforcing transparency and institutional continuity for members dispersed across multiple cities. Operational coordination improved through standardized design support, unified branding, and timely dissemination of information, ensuring coherence across chapters. Business development advanced with the registration of an additional union-affiliated enterprise, while member engagement was elevated through the Birthday Recognition Initiative, which honored 373 celebrants. Significant gains in digital outreach, spanning Facebook, WeChat, and YouTube, further demonstrated the Secretariat's commitment to modernized communication, organizational efficiency, and long-term institutional growth.

4.2. Knowledge Sharing and Publications

Throughout the fourth quarter, the National Secretariat sustained its communication and documentation mandate through the publication of six editions of the LSUIC Chronicle (Volume 1, Numbers 15 through 20). Each edition captured committee activities, member features, and national updates, serving a Union whose membership is dispersed across numerous cities with limited shared reading resources. The Secretariat continues to emphasize the Chronicle's role in "safeguarding the Union's institutional memory," a claim reinforced by the newsletter's consistent presence throughout this reporting period.

During this period, the Secretariat further strengthened its communication architecture by ensuring regular dissemination of information and maintaining engagement across LSUIC platforms. The Chronicle's steady publication rhythm contributed to improved transparency, stronger coordination, and a more unified national communication structure. These efforts collectively enhanced institutional continuity, reinforced member connection, and supported the Union's broader administrative and strategic objectives.



4.3 Business Registration and Enterprise Support

Over the quarter, the National Secretariat recorded notable progress in promoting student entrepreneurship through the steady expansion of union-affiliated businesses. One (1) new business was officially registered during this period, contributing to the broader growth. This increased the number of recognized unions-affiliated enterprises from eleven (11) to twelve (12). This continued growth underscores the National Secretariat's commitment to economically empowering students and fostering a supportive environment for entrepreneurial development within the Union. Beyond facilitating new registrations, the Secretariat also maintained active oversight of business advertisements, ensuring that all enterprises adhered to their assigned promotional time slots and upheld fairness in the Union's business ecosystem.

4.4 Design Support and Scholars Recognition

Throughout the quarter, the National Secretariat delivered extensive communication and design support to committees and city chapters, ensuring that all activities were effectively promoted and consistently aligned with the Union's branding standards. This sustained effort played a vital role in preserving a unified and professional LSUIC identity while strengthening the visibility of programs and initiatives across both national and city levels. The Secretariat's proactive engagement ensured that every announcement, event, and publication adhered to established communication guidelines, thereby enhancing clarity, uniformity, and institutional coherence.

A key highlight of the quarter was the Secretariat's continued implementation of its Birthday Recognition Initiative, one of its most reliably executed programs. From late March through late June, the Secretariat compiled and verified a comprehensive database of celebrants and recognized approximately 373 members with personalized flyers shared across the Union's platforms. This initiative has become a meaningful morale-boosting tradition, visibly reflected in the long lists of celebrant names featured in each edition of the Chronicle. By combining strong communication

support with thoughtful member engagement, the Secretariat strengthened unity, enhanced student visibility, and reinforced a sense of belonging throughout the Union.

4.5 Communication and Digital Visibility

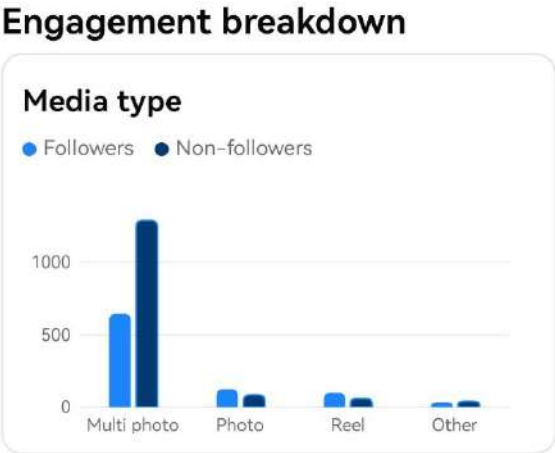
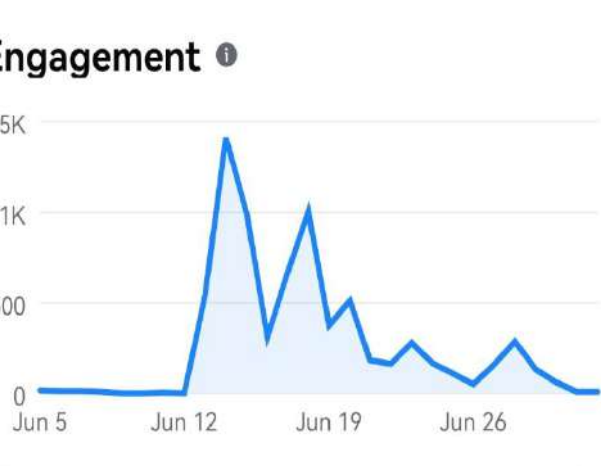
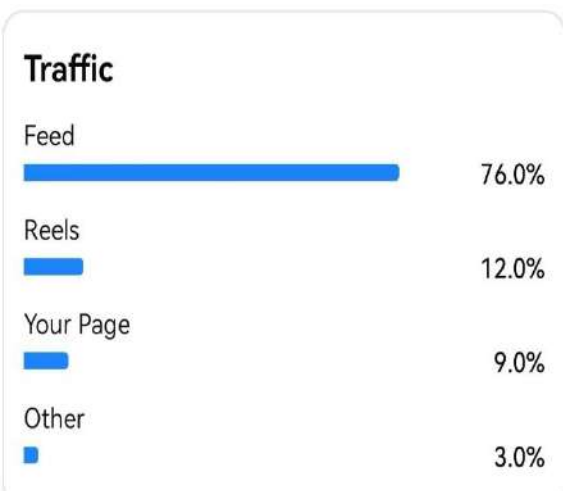
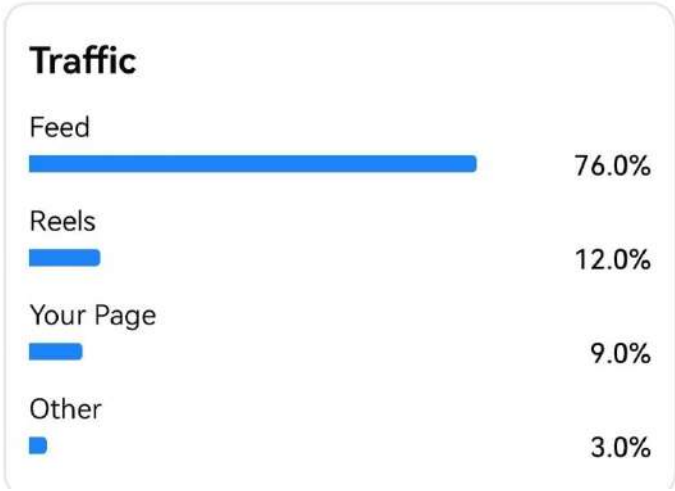
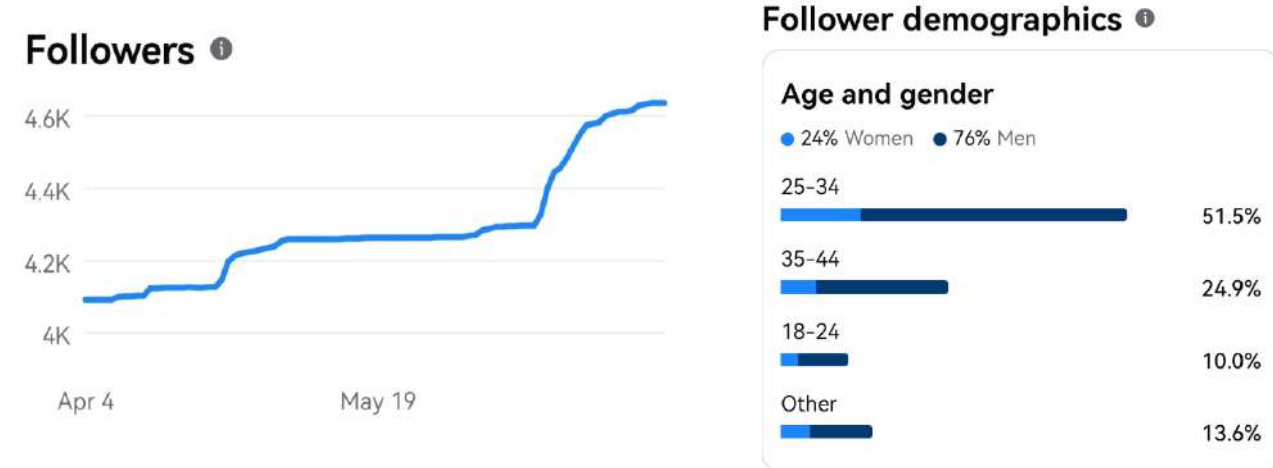
Over the fourth quarter, the National Secretariat achieved major advancements in strengthening LSUIC's communication framework and expanding its digital presence across key platforms. The Union's Facebook page continued its upward trajectory, rising from 3.1K followers in July 2025 to 4,636 followers, marking a substantial improvement of 1,536 new followers within a single year. This growth, on a platform established in February 2016, demonstrates the increasing interest in and engagement with LSUIC's activities, reflecting the Secretariat's sustained efforts to enhance visibility and connect more effectively with its diverse audience. 10K engagements, a remarkable 73% increase over the previous period. The page also gained 550 new followers, reflecting a 27% rise in audience size. Traffic sources showed that 67% of new reach came from Suggested Content, followed by 24% from Follower Feed, 4% from Unavailable sources, and 5% from Other channels. In terms of content access, Feed traffic accounted for 76%, with Reels contributing 12%, Page visits 9%, and Other sources 3%. These metrics collectively demonstrate the effectiveness of the Secretariat's digital communication strategy and the growing visibility of LSUIC activities.

On the WeChat Channel, the Secretariat continued its aggressive digital expansion. Over the current fiscal year, 40 new videos were uploaded, excluding the 10 videos produced under the previous administration. These uploads generated 20,409 total views, with the channel's followers increasing from 100 within two years to 320, marking a significant gain of 220 new followers within six months. Engagement remained strong, with approximately 1,432 total likes and loves, alongside 919 shares and comments, reflecting active audience interaction and content relevance.

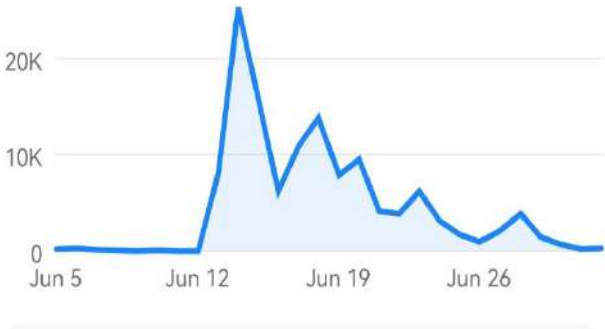
Further extending LSUIC's digital archive, the Secretariat uploaded 111 videos to the Union's YouTube channel, capturing major programs, events, and institutional activities. This systematic documentation ensures long-term preservation of LSUIC's institutional memory while expanding access for members across China and beyond.

Collectively, these achievements highlight the Secretariat's commitment to leveraging digital platforms to enhance visibility, strengthen communication, and ensure comprehensive documentation of the Union's work for broader engagement and future reference.

Facebook Views Trend

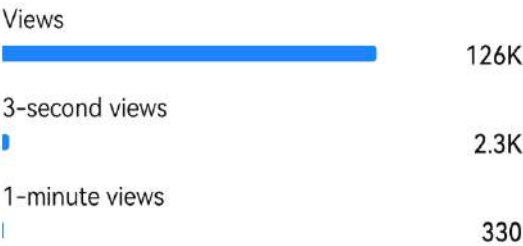

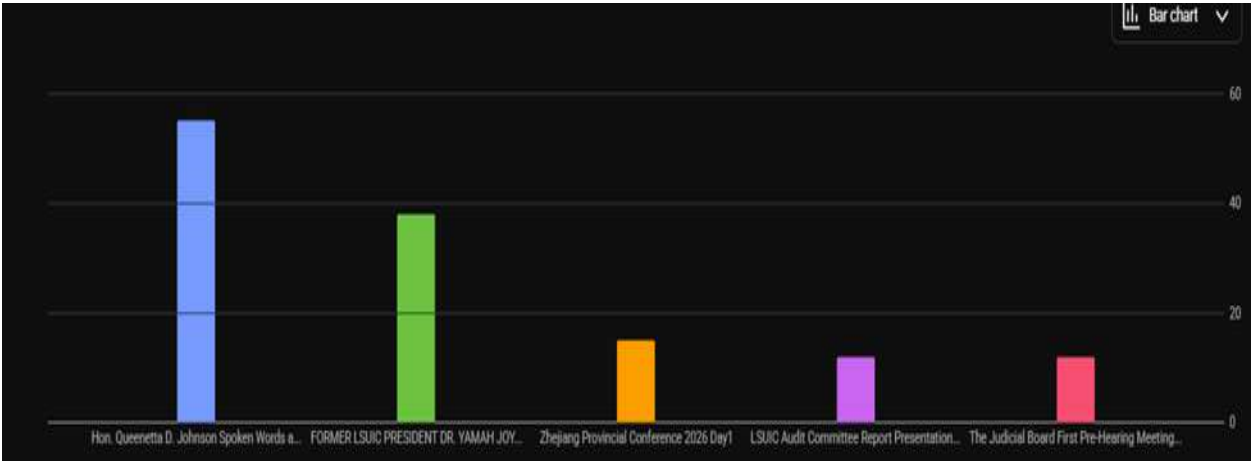


Views breakdown ⓘ

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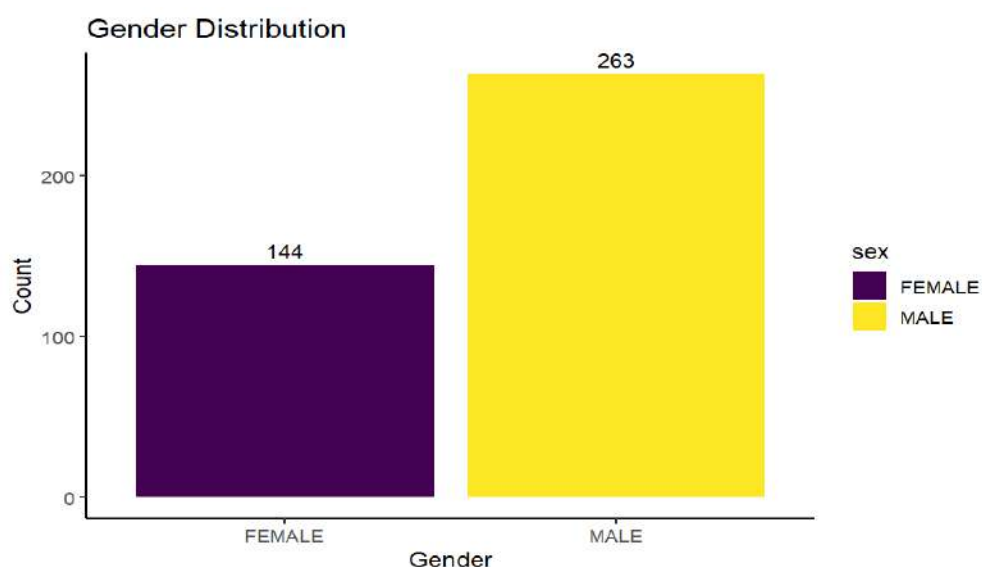

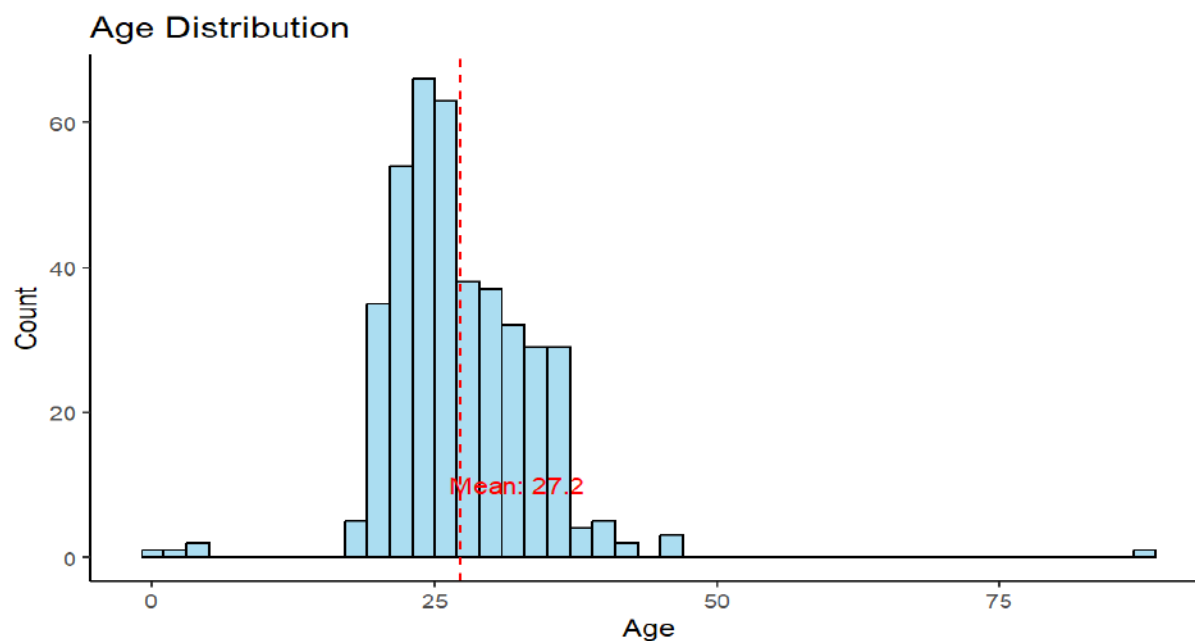
GENDER DISTRIBUTION

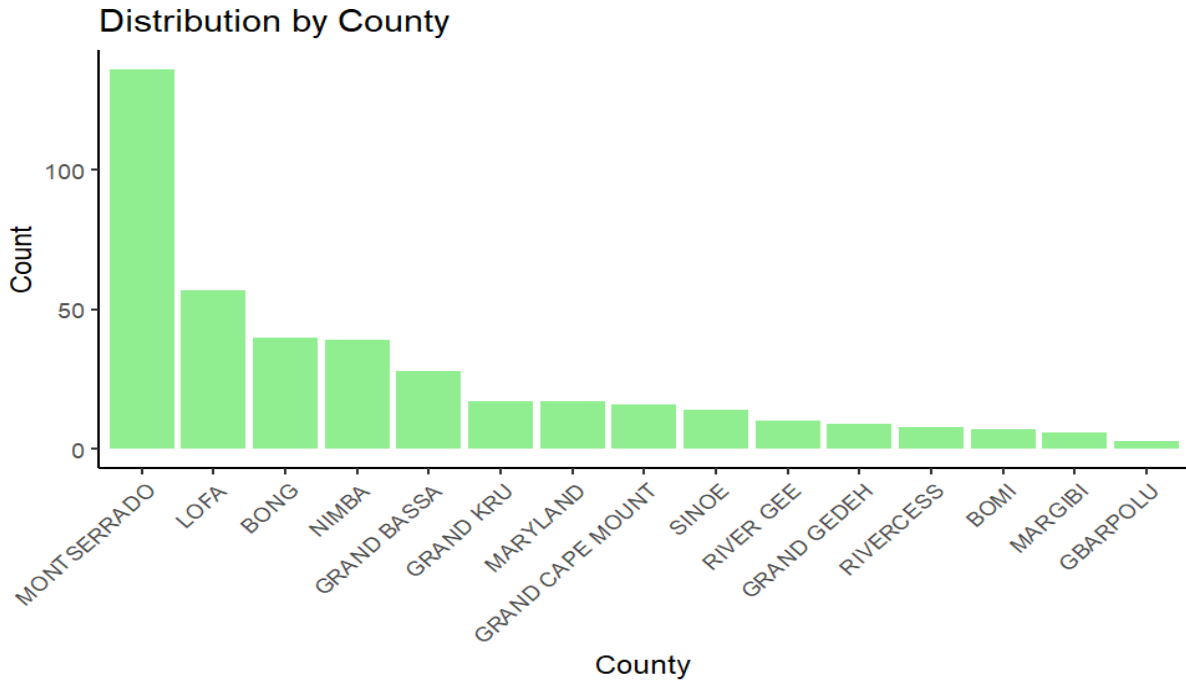


AGE DISTRIBUTION

What We Were Testing

We wanted to know if there is a **real difference** in average age between female and male scholars, or if any difference we see is just due to random chance.

The Basic Numbers

1. **Female scholars** had an average age of **26.5 years**
2. **Male scholars** had an average age of **27.7 years**
3. So, male scholars were about **1.2 years older** on average

Then we ask ourselves:

Is this 1.2-year difference meaningful, or could it just be a coincidence?

The Main Finding

No statistically significant difference was found between the ages of female and male scholars.

What Does "Not Significant" Mean?

Think of it this way: If you randomly picked two groups of people from the same population, you would often see small differences in their average ages. The difference we found (1.2 years) is small enough that it could easily happen by chance.

The p-value Explained

1. The **p-value** is 0.1176 (about 12%)
2. In simple terms: there is a **12% chance** that we would see this age difference even if there were NO real difference between genders
3. Most researchers use a 5% "cutoff" ($p < 0.05$) to call something significant
4. Since 12% is greater than 5%, we cannot confidently say men and women have different average ages

The Confidence Interval

The 95% confidence interval ranges from **-2.61 to 0.29** years. This means:

1. We are 95% confident that the true age difference between genders falls somewhere between women being 2.6 years younger to women being 0.3 years older
2. Because this interval includes zero (which would mean no difference), it reinforces that we cannot rule out there being no real age difference. There is no strong statistical evidence that female and male scholars differ in age. Both groups are, on average, in their late 20s, with very similar age ranges.

5.7 Challenges of the National Secretariat

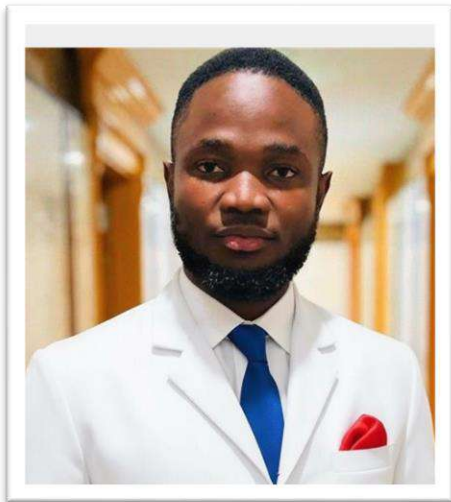

5.8 Conclusion

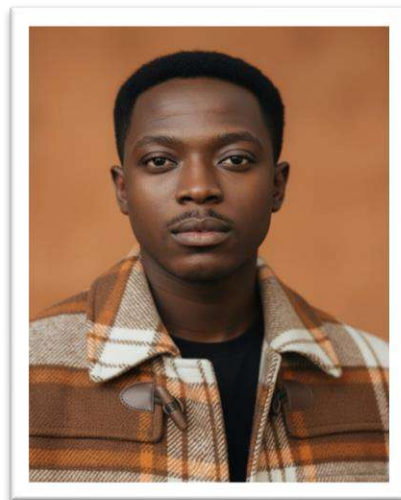

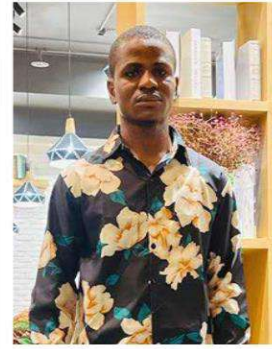

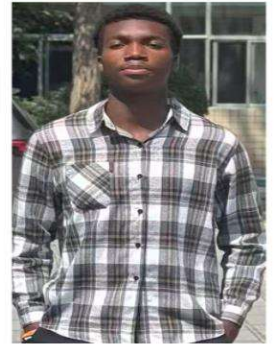
